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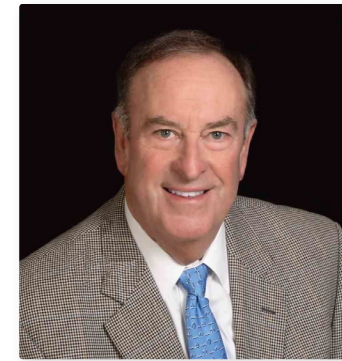

PASTORAL CARE 101

If you were asked to give a clear, cogent meaning of pastoral care, what would it be? The definition I remember being offered to me many years ago was in a book written by Clebsch and Jaekle. They define pastoral care as “The ministry of the cure of souls, or pastoral care, consists of helping acts, done by representative religious persons, directed toward the healing, sustaining, guiding and reconciling of troubled persons whose troubles arise in the context of ultimate meanings and concerns.” Healing, sustaining, guiding and reconciling of troubled persons seems to be an overwhelming assignment. Yes, it is.

Our friend Jaco Hammon has reminded us in the past that a better translation of the Isaiah passage is not that Messiah would come to preach the Good news, but rather to en flesh the good news or *be* the good news. Perhaps our best pastoral care comes when we attempt to *be* the good news.

It is always good to gather together and spend time with you. This will be a good opportunity for you to be reminded of some things you already know and perhaps learn something new. Join us.
